Q&A with Tibor Gonczol Q: Tibor, how can I practice the duelling section without turning targets since my club is no in the process of rebuilding the rapid-fire range and the targets are not available. I must practice for my timing. Signed off as 'Woman alone" A: First of all, while you have no turning target, do not shoot matches in practice, do not shoot for scores, just practice the fundamentals without worrying about timing. Practice tight groups, practice trigger control, correct grip, stance, smoothness, breath-control et etc and you will find that you will not have much trouble learning the right timing when the time comes that you have moving targets to shoot on. If you have to shoot scores, then get someone with a stopwatch to time you. Having a stopwatch for yourself is a

helpful also as you can stand on front of the target with the watch in your hand instead of a pistol then, when you are ready, press the stop watch, start it, raise your hand with it, fire the imaginary string of shots at the last "shot" stop the watch and check the time. If you took too short or too long, correct it as the next string. If you do this frequently enough you can develop a very accurate sense of timing that will not let you down.


I would like to thank the following through your column for grants of ammunition made available to the shooting section of the Australian Olympic Team to Mexico:

He was "up and down" like the cost of living, but it was a 10 and I couldn't help but recall how Guschkin in Rome in 1960 took 90 minutes for his first 5 practice shots and then went on to break the Olympic record with 561 which included a 6 with his last shot.

Fifty-six shooters from nine clubs attended the competition which was over 30 shots rapid fire, thirty shots free pistol and a full course of centre fire.

GROWTH IN NORTH OUEENSLAND

News of Cairns Pistol Club which has been affiliated with OAPSA for just over twelve months. "Our range was approved in January 1967 and consists of 24 free pistol bays and two sets of automatic rapid-fire targets. Full 60 shot matches in all five events are contested once a month. Rapid Fire and free pistol share the

2nd Sunday of each month and centre fire standard pistol and ladies match the fourth Sunday of each month. Five club members shot in the Oueensland State Titles held at the new Belmont Range in Brisbane in October 4th & 5th. They were Dick Fitzhardinge, Noel Ryan, T. Armstrong, Doug McMillan and Mrs Lyn McMillan. N. Ryan won the Masters grade rapid fire with 570, masters centre fire with 575 and the open standard pistol event with 558. The aggregate of rapid fire, free pistol and centre fire resulted in a tie between Noel Rvan of Cairns and Karl Bauer of Mackay who both shot 1665 points.

Queensland **NEW RECORD**

Twenty-five-year-old Cairns pistol shooter Noel Ryan won the open standard pistol event, Masters centre fire and rapid fire at the Queensland State Titles, setting new State Records in standard pistol, 558 & centre fire 575.
