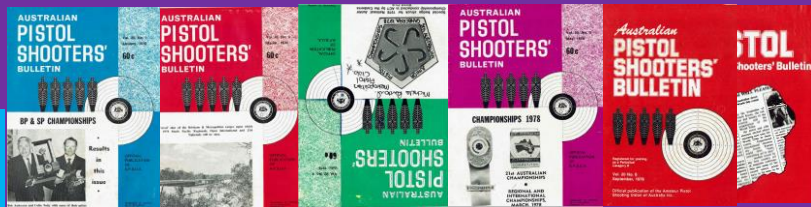


Flashback Friday to 1978

CAIRNS TENTH ANNIVERSARY OPEN SHOOT

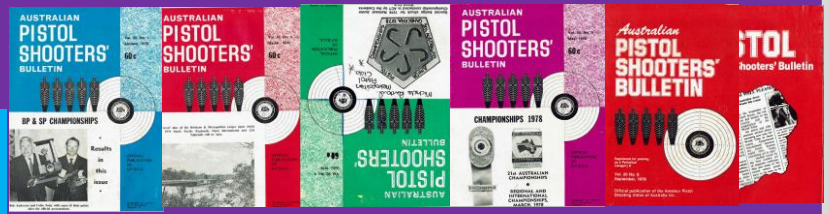
Fifty-Three shooters from as far away as Clermont, Darwin, Mt Isa, Mackay, Townsville, and Ayr attended.

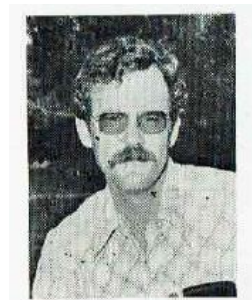
Bits 'n' Pieces
